Dear readers,

A turbulent year is drawing to a close. The global pandemic undoubtedly marked the six months of Germany's EU Council Presidency.

Despite challenging conditions, the European community was nevertheless able to adopt a new EU budget and commit billions of euros in a coronavirus recovery package last week after lengthy negotiations. Another significant milestone was already reached at the beginning of December: Negotiations on the so-called Post-Cotonou Agreement came to a successful conclusion. Other plans, by contrast, could not be implemented due to the COVID-19 crisis. 2020 was meant to be an EU-Africa year, culminating in a summit in October to adopt a new EU-Africa strategy. The EU intends to hold a physical meeting in the coming year.

A conclusive verdict on the German EU Council Presidency in 2020 is therefore not (yet) in reach. 'We will have to work right up to the last day,' stressed Chancellor Angela Merkel at the end of November during the virtual conference of the Parliamentary Committees for Union Affairs of the EU. Germany will hand over the EU Council Presidency to Portugal on 1 January 2021. In July, it will be Slovenia's turn. Thanks to the Trio Programme, efforts towards implementing jointly set objectives will continue over the next 12 months. For GIZ, the EU remains an important setter of political frameworks and a key partner, including in numerous projects, some of which we would like to present to you in this newsletter. All in all, there are enough reasons to look forward to 2021 with hope.

We wish you an enjoyable read and – despite the current circumstances – happy holidays and a healthy start into the New Year.

# Teamwork and transnational cooperation

In the Western Balkans, prosecutors and investigators are fighting organised crime

The countries of the Western Balkans are still considered an international transit zone for trade in illegal goods. In 2019, a team of investigators in Northern Macedonia successfully struck a significant blow against a drug cartel. The success of the search resulted from effective cooperation against cross-border crime – realised with the support of GIZ on behalf of the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) and co-funded by the EU. The

project aims to improve collaboration between the police and public prosecutors' offices in the Balkan countries and the EU. Already, more than 100 investigations received assistance. For more, take a look at GIZ's integrated company report.

## 'Oases' in Egypt's big cities Leisure centres for learning, games and recreation

Many people, little space: There are no green areas or parks in the rapidly growing districts of Egypt's major cities. Recreational centres are often only available to residents in affluent neighbourhoods. To enable people in less privileged communities to meet in a clean and safe place, a project commissioned by BMZ is expanding these centres in Egypt. The social clubs and youth centres co-financed by the EU are planned and designed together with the local communities. A decade ago, 'green economy' was little more than a concept on paper. And today? 'The EU's Green Deal and the current debates on green recovery packages to overcome the COVID-19 crisis show that a green economy is well-positioned to provide policy solutions to the challenges we face in the 21st century,' explains Steve Stone, Head of the Resources and Markets branch at the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP). In our interview, he and GIZ climate expert Vera Scholz talk about the opportunities their cooperation offers. GIZ and UNEP have been working together successfully since 2011, for example on environmental reforms in taxation and subsidies in South Africa on behalf of the International Climate Initiative (IKI) of the BMU.

# Agroforestry made easy Live expert training in Timor-Leste

# From Ghanaian fields to dinner tables around the world Promoting sustainable supply chains through agribusiness und innovation

Agriculture and the food industry are among the most important sectors of Ghana's emerging economy. Yet four-fifths of agricultural products still come from small farms. To make them more competitive, GIZ supports them on behalf of the BMZ and co-funded by the EU. Georgina Koomson shows how this works in practice. The Ghanaian entrepreneur describes how she has been able to expand her knowledge of farming methods and international market access through trainings: 'That's where I learned how a processor actually works.' In 2019 alone, roughly 15,000 farmers attended training events. By adopting modern growing techniques, gaining organic certification and entering into contracts with customers, yields increased by up to 50 per cent.
