





Strengthening the Rule of Law and Anti-Corruption Mechanisms in the Republic of Moldova Combating and preventing corruption

General context

In the past decade, the Republic of Moldova has demonstrated a proactive commitment to combating corruption through legislative amendments and the reorganization of state institutions. Despite these efforts, challenges persist due to the fragmented nature of anti-corruption agencies and ambiguity in their authority. The fight against corruption is hindered by systemic issues, including ineffective measures against high-level corruption, deeply entrenched vested interests, and a lack of independence among judges and prosecutors. Corruption is prevalent in vital sectors such as education and health, with local public authorities often lacking the capacity and political will to ensure transparency.

Recognizing the imperative for a comprehensive strategy, Moldova has integrated anti-corruption efforts into its EU integration plans, committing to reforms. More recently, the EU has initiated accession negotiations with Moldova. The European Commission's decision to open accession negotiations underscores the country's significant progress, especially in justice reform, anti-corruption measures, de-oligarchization, and enhanced civil society participation.

In the context of EU integration, Moldova has made significant strides in aligning with European standards, focusing on stable institutions, democracy, the rule of law, human rights, and minority protection. The 2023 Enlargement Package by the European Commission underscores Moldova's progress, emphasizing fundamental reforms and outlining priorities for further advancement. Moldova's commitment is evident in the comprehensive justice reform, anti-corruption initiatives, and the adoption of a de-oligarchization action plan. Notably, the country has increased investigations and convictions related to corruption cases, introduced legislation for a confiscation mechanism against organized crime, and actively engaged civil society in decision-making processes. Moldova's dedication to systemic improvements positions it favorably as it seeks EU integration, showcasing a commitment to a transparent, accountable, and democratic future.



Project objectives

In support of the Moldovan government's commitments to enhance the effectiveness of state and civil society measures against corruption, GIZ is implementing the "Strengthening the Rule of Law and Anti-Corruption Mechanisms in the Republic of Moldova" project (ACT Project). This technical cooperation project receives joint financing from the European Union (EU) and the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ).

The project's objective is to contribute to the prevention and fight against corruption in Moldova. This is achieved

through various approaches: engaging civil society in corruption prevention; strengthening the institutional and operational capacities of specialized investigative authorities and public prosecutor's offices; ensuring efficient corruption and money laundering prevention; the fight against illegal asset recovery and repatriation; the declaration of assets and conflicts of interest; enhancing the communication and cooperation skills of partner institutions to improve efficiency in the anticorruption process chain. The project aligns both with the priorities of the current Moldovan government and supports Moldova's path towards becoming a member of the EU, specifically in the area of anti-corruption and judicial reform.

Expected results

The level of citizens activity, especially at local level, in the prevention and fight against corruption, and the awareness of citizens on the harms of corruption and on the ways to fight corruption have increased.

The institutional and operational capacities of the existing specialised investigation and prosecutors' bodies have increased in order to assure an efficient and effective prevention and fight against corruption and money laundering.

The national criminal asset recovery system is fully in place and has a progressive track record for identification, freezing, management and confiscation of criminal assets.

Effective systems of declaration of assets and conflict of interests are fully implemented.

Measures for the effective prevention of corruption risks, (which were identified in three high-risk sectors), are strengthened based on the results of the Sectorial Action Plans.

Framework conditions for external and internal communication and cooperation, fostering effective collaboration among key stakeholders for sustained success in anti-corruption efforts improved.

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
