Indonesia, as the third largest democracy and the fourth largest country in terms of population, has been a partner country of German Development Cooperation since 1958 and one of the Global Partners of the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ).

Germany, as ASEAN's development partner, focuses its Development Cooperation with ASEAN on climate and environmental protection, sustainable economic development, institutional strengthening and economic coherence within ASEAN.


ASEAN's regional integration, socio-cultural aspects and centrality serve as interlinkage between ASEAN and Indonesia, and are crucial for Indonesia's development agenda, offering expanded markets and cooperative frameworks for economic, environmental and social progress. Our joint actions with ASEAN are an integral role in this context, providing technical expertise and facilitating sustainable development projects that align with both Indonesian and ASEAN goals.

Transition, Resilient Nature, and Urban Development, as well as the topics of Technical Vocational Education and Training (TVET) and Green Jobs, and Digital Transformation.

use sectors. At the same time Indonesia, as an island state, is severely affected by climate change.

Due to its rapid economic development, the G20 and ASEAN member is now an emerging country with increasing regional and global importance, and the World Bank has classified it as an upper-middle-income country.

Energy Transition: Powering Toward a Golden Indonesia

Indonesia's energy system is undergoing a massive change to meet growing demand for power, moving from fossil fuel to renewable energy while keeping the power supply affordable.

The nation's commitment to the energy transition is part of its Golden Indonesia 2045 programme to become an advanced country. President Prabowo Subianto has laid out an ambitious vision for the nation's energy transition: net-zero emissions (NZE) by 2060, 75GW of new renewable energy capacity, and the phasing out of coal by 2040.

Under the umbrella of the Energy Programme, GIZ has been active in Indonesia and ASEAN for more than 25 years. We provide policy advice, develop energy skills and spearhead renewable energy solutions. Today, the Energy Transition cooperation area supports the Indonesian government across five strategic areas:

- **Power System Transformation:** Powering Indonesia's future by shifting from fossil fuel to renewable energy power systems
- **Island Energy Solutions:** Clean power for remote communities for energy equality
- **Industry Decarbonisation:** Driving Indonesia's green economy by integrating renewable energy and energy efficiency
- **Just Energy Transition:** Affordable and green energy for all, leaving no-one behind
- **Sustainable Energy Financing:** Attracting private investors through fiscal policy and financial instruments.

The success of Indonesia's energy transition is crucial for achieving national, regional and global climate and energy goals. GIZ looks forward to continuing its partnership with the Indonesian government, in close collaboration with the private sector, civil society and academia.

Indonesia is also among the world's largest carbon emitters, as its economic growth remains heavily reliant on fossil fuels, exacerbating global greenhouse gas emissions. As a result, the country is already experiencing the negative impacts of climate change and unsustainable development, which include forest and biodiversity loss, habitat degradation, and increased vulnerability to natural disasters.

Striking a balance between economic development and the sustainable management of its natural resources is crucial – not only for Indonesia's future but also in the global fight against climate change.

Through the Resilient Nature cooperation area, GIZ acts as a strategic development partner to Indonesia and ASEAN, bringing in practicable and integrated solutions and building local capacity to enhance resilience to climate change, reduce environmental degradation and improve the livelihood of rural communities.

Together, we shape a future worth living in Indonesia and around the world.

The areas we focus on:

- **Biodiversity:** Mainstreaming biodiversity conservation into government strategies and plans and promoting sustainable practices, in collaboration with the private sector and local communities, and protecting ecosystems
- **Climate Change:** Supporting the planning and implementation of actions toward reducing emissions and adapting human activities to the effects of climate change
- **Agriculture:** Promoting sustainable agricultural practices which increase resilience and improve farmers' livelihoods

Urban Development: Building Liveable Cities

Indonesia's rapid economic growth and urbanisation is projected to lead to an urban population of over 220 million, or 70% of the total population, by 2045. This presents great challenges for policymakers to provide accessible public services in cities while decarbonising urban infrastructure.

GIZ supports Indonesia in this endeavour, focusing on:

- **Mobility:** Developing sustainable and low-carbon transport solutions which increase the efficiency, effectiveness and equitability of urban mobility
- **Circular Economy:** Reducing and managing material and waste streams throughout the value chain, both in organisational terms and via infrastructure solutions.

Another, but less prominent, area of cooperation is Water and Wastewater Management, with the objective of providing access to drinking water and modern sanitation.

Green Jobs and Vocational Education and Training: Developing Skills for a Green Economy

As Indonesia moves toward a low-carbon, green economy where non-sustainable sectors are shrinking, its labour market welcomes nearly three million new job seekers every year. However, the Vocational Education and Training (VET) system – the backbone of workforce development – is struggling to keep up with the demand in the labour market, leaving a gap between the skills of the labour force and the needs of employers.

To bridge this gap, GIZ supports Indonesia's transition to a competitive, environmentally sustainable, and inclusive economy by focusing on how the shift to green growth can create decent job opportunities for all. New approaches and strategies for adequately skilling, upskilling and reskilling are needed, and our work aims to provide them.

In short, we support the government to help both young graduates and the existing workforce gain the necessary skills to work productively in the green economy.

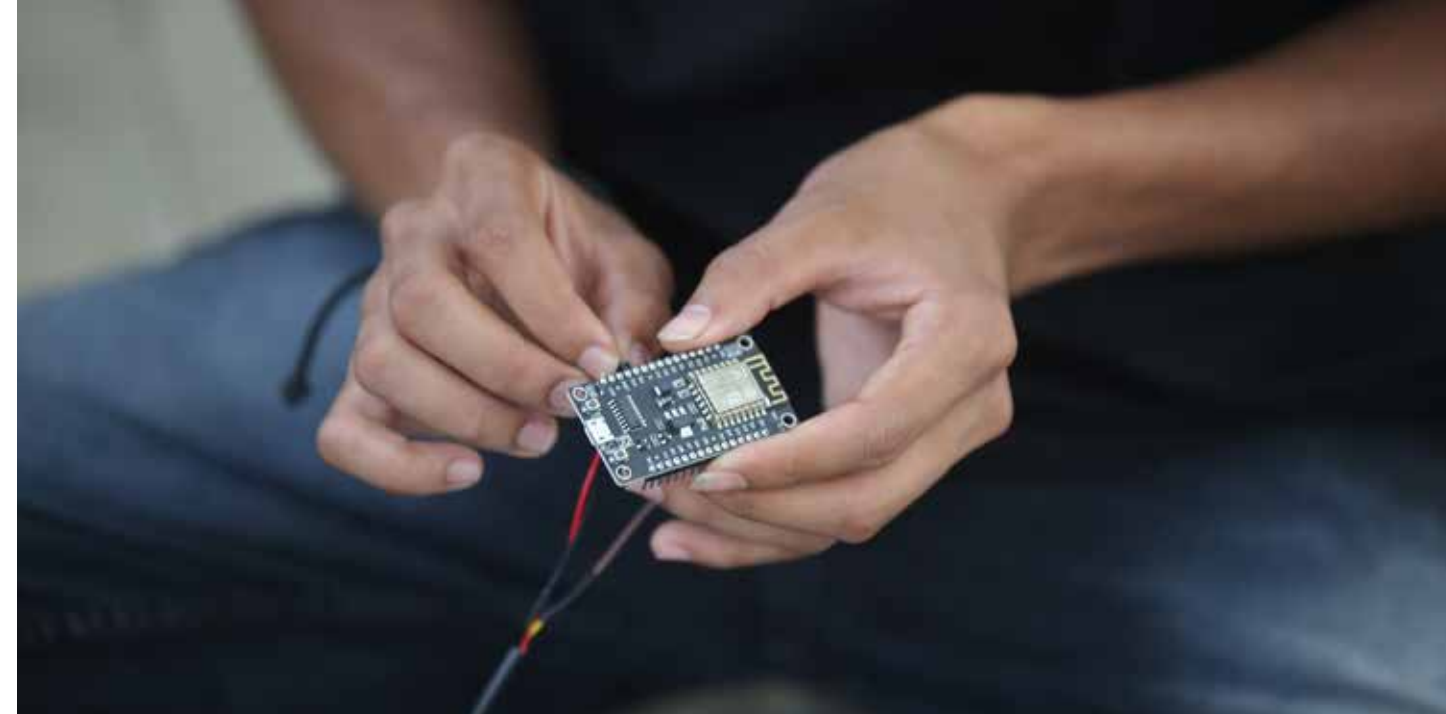

skills development expertise and international good practices in the fields of renewable energy and energy efficiency, forestry and sustainable land use, sustainable urban development, and the circular economy. This is complemented by advice on safe and regular migration, and by facilitating fair and sustainable labour migration for Indonesian skilled workers to Germany.



Digital Transformation: Greater Connectivity for a Better, Greener Future

Indonesia's digital transformation is accelerating, driven by the rapid adoption of digital services, a dynamic start-up ecosystem, and strong government initiatives. With its growing digital economy, Indonesia has the potential to bridge socio-economic gaps but also faces challenges related to inclusivity, environmental sustainability, and regulatory frameworks.

German Development Cooperation supports Indonesia in achieving a just digital transition by promoting policies and initiatives which ensure equitable access to technology and digital skills. Programmes focus on digital literacy, inclusion of marginalised communities, and fostering responsible AI and data governance.

A key aspect of this cooperation is digital green innovation, aligning digitalisation with climate goals. By supporting smart infrastructure, sustainable digital businesses, and responsible resource use, Germany and Indonesia work together to integrate sustainability into digital growth.

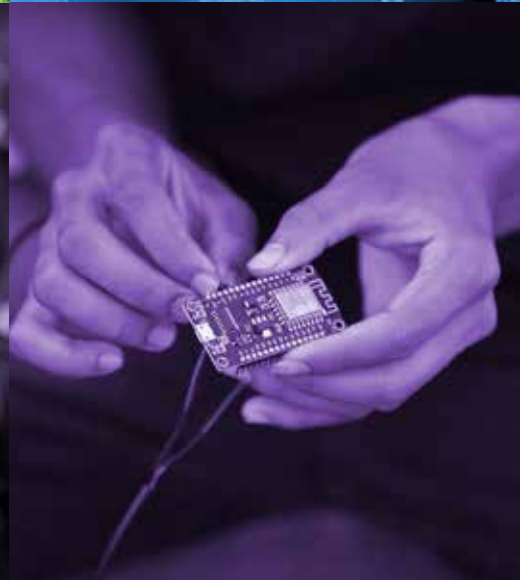
