




## **Background**

Almost 1.5 million IDPs registered in Ukraine since 2014

More than 70 % of IDPs settled in Eastern Ukraine

## **IIPU: Perspectives for Eastern Ukraine**



• 6.5 MiO people benefit from our work including **350,000** IDP

• Project budget: 94.4 Mio Euro

• Duration: 2015 – 2020

Lessons learned from Ukraine












IIPU – Perspectives for Eastern Ukraine have implemented over 800 activities all over Eastern Ukraine

- ✓ Over 6 500 000 IDPs and local residents benefit from IIPU activities
- ✓ Cooperation with more than 100 communities in 6 regions
- ✓ Support to more than 70 NGOs and civil society organizations
- ✓ Improved healthcare for 200 000 people
- ✓ Improved studying conditions for 40 000 children at schools and kindergartens
- ✓ Over 90 social institutions are selected for renovation and technical equipment
- ✓ 5 000 emergency responders work safer



### **Administrative Services**

- GIZ supported 25 towns of Zaporizhzhia, Dnipro and Kharkiv regions with new mobile digital cases for administrative, social and legal services.
- The citizens of remote areas, people with disabilities, elderly people and those who can't reach the centres are able to receive services at home.

### More than 3,5 million people get better municipal services



### Education

- GIZ renovated and refurbished schools and kindergartens, provided educational institutions with new equipment and furniture and also offered workshops and trainings for almost thousand participants
- 40,000 people including approximately 3,500 internally displaced people benefit from these activities



## **Therapy Dogs**

- GIZ supported the development of dog therapy in Eastern Ukraine to provide help to those affected by the conflict
- 28 licensed dog handlers and 41 psychologists, jointly with the trained dogs have already provided more than 640 therapy sessions in the east of Ukraine.
- This helped more that 1000 children and their families and the number is constantly growing.



#### **Lessons Learned**



- Be quick, flexible, adjustable to change
- Hosting communities should benefit as much as IDPs
- Integration was key for IDPs and hosting communities
- Big budget allows to achieve significant big-scale results
- Poor infrastructure remains in GCA more needs to be done



### Outlook 2019

We expand further east: Further project activities with a focus on GCA starting 2019


We provide a stable structure: Opening of an additional office in GCA (Mariupol or Kramatorsk)


We are flexible: Ready for partnerships and upscaling in all areas we are working in

- Strengthening technical capacities
- Improving professional skills
- Support to develop a decentralized emergency management system
- Assistance in crisis situations

## **Municipal Services**



- Consultation of municipal and regional administrations
- Optimization of decision-making and work processes
- Provision of modern equipment to service centers
  - Capacity development for public institutions and civil society organizations

# **Healthcare Facilities & Psychosocial Support**



- Consultation and capacity development at state and civil society organizations
- Improvement of demand-oriented services in psychosocial support
- Provision of equipment for nursing, rehabilitation and care facilities
- Integration and conflict management activities at host communities

### **Education**



- Rehabilitation and reconstruction of social infrastructure
- Provision of technical equipment
- Trainings to support acquisition of finance for infrastructure projects
- Development of accommodation concepts for IDPs
